Report on Connections Talking Circle 3—Discovering All Relationships/Networks Our Faith Community Builds Beyond Itself (DARN)

Summary

The third tough task of interim transition, after leadership, is connections. The congregation was offered two (2) talking circles to discuss aspects of leadership.

The DARN talking circles had 16 participants, including one e-mail response to the questions. The reasons for attending circles included wanting to renew commitment to church, wanting to improve connections, belief that networks are important, and (importance of our) values we make to the community. The Archives committee also submitted their research on church connections for discussion during the circles and for this report.

Details on the circles and the contributions made are given below.

- 2. How do we decide as a congregation what connections to make and what kind they will be (church-supported vs. affinity group)?
 - o Past connections; some are traditional and have been around a long time
 - o Workshops
 - Person with interest/passion brings it to church to see if church will formalize action/money to make it come alive
 - A lot of things come from the board (e.g., community contacts church for help and Board decides whether or not to pursue)
 - Current Social Justice committee suggested IUUWAN to Board; Board approved, congregation was asked what areas they wanted to act on this year; Social Justice committee surveyed congregation's interests for action (but) congregation did not vote on specific projects (e.g.Olivet classroom)
 - At the end of last year the SJC conducted a survey to determine what social justice areas the members wanted to focus on in 2015. It was poverty/income inequality, followed by racial injustice and the environment. Therefore, the SJC focused its activities along these lines. My plan is to have the SJC propose some SJ initiatives (based on the interests of the SJC) to the membership at the Annual Meeting in Dec and have a vote. Whichever initiative has the most votes is where we focus our efforts in 2016. I think it is very important for the membership to decide on the SJ initiative so there is some ownership and investment. And, we can also ask the membership if they even wish to pursue SJ efforts. It is up to them.
 - Minister and other staff make connections
 - Spin-offs: Church members start working on a project and it becomes a separate entity (e.g., IAAF)

- Social media and individual initiatives make connections grow quickly
- Our kids are sharing with their friends that Christianity is not the only way and that brings awareness of our church to other youth
- Affinity groups are started by people with an interest (e.g. bridge, Wednesday night workshops, etc.)
- Might be time to survey church members about their desires/interests about what they want addressed
- o (How has involvement changed?) We have ebb and flow. (Things are) very active then we regroup. The leadership of the minister sets the tone (outwardly active or regroup).
- o (How has involvement changed?) When we have state legislators or other elected officials in our congregation, we are more politically active.
- (How has involvement changed?) In 3rd Ave location, we rented our space to lots of different community groups
- 3. What do we do to keep our connections alive and strong?
 - o Connect our FB page to those outside connections we have made
 - Have time limits to our commitments to outside entities. For instance, we committed to the Head Start Classroom for the calendar year of 2015. After that, we move on to the next priority of the membership.
 - Wherever we form bonds/coalitions to promote social; justice and equality, we find ways to publicize it and let the local community know who we are, what we are doing, and why
 - o Even when things are in the newsletter, at least 1/3 of the people say nobody told them
 - o It's not enough to read and post on Face Book; we need to use web sites, call our administrator, tell the minister, talk to friends, put it in the Voice, post it on a bulletin board
 - o It all depends on the person willing to keep that connection alive—can be random
 - Would like to see connections between our social justice work and other churches
 - o Connections are rooted in people who take their connection to the church seriously
 - We need to stay active and engaged ourselves; people have to invest themselves and stay informed
 - External connections may need to be planned by group
 - Visual poster of what is going on
 - o RE program: the kids are going to have a float in the Holiday Parade
 - o Post list of historical connections on large paper in the Andre Room
 - We need to have a central communication module—would be great to have something centralized

The Voice: 1984-1988

(Reviewed by Joye Winey-2015)

There didn't appear to be major things happening during this period, but an intense continuation of world and community involvement.

The Voice was a vehicle for sharing events in the Cedar Rapids and larger community that Peoples People were interested. There was exciting conversation during coffee hours, before and after church. There were well attended social functions. Church attendance was high (80-105).

July 1987

The elevator was nearing completion. (Sept.'87)

The cost estimate was \$38,000; the actual cost was \$38.400.

June 1988

Included in each Voice:

Talent Shows," Young UU" corner- a column of what was happening with the youth of the church.

Anniversaries, celebrations were noted.

Minister's column was called "Jeremy's Journal" and included his thoughts and books he was reading.

Picnics, all church retreats, Potlucks, were commonly mentioned.

Frequent requests for Volunteers for outside organizations: Crisis counselor, Muscular dystrophy and the Willis Dady center were among those frequently mentioned.

A note that the Budget was in trouble and to please pay pledges.

Attendance numbers for Sunday's sanctuary and youth attendance was included.

October 1987

A special collection for new hymnals was held. (The gray ones?) Attendance was 105.

Frequent High Coffees

A petition to the City council to Support the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty was passed.

Visitor's names were included in the Voice

Committee Chairs, Bios for those running for the Board of Trustees.

Thanks to those who participated in the Worship Service.

Sept. 1987

The Historian Was Hope West.

The Margaret Pratt Library Fund gave \$800. yearly to the public library for the purchase of new books.

Small group dinners were starting (again?)

We were collecting Eyeglasses and Hearing Aids to be sent to Haiti.

A block of twenty was being reserved for Peoples People to attend a performance at the Cedar Rapids Community Theatre.

PARTNER CHURCH HISTORY

February 24, 1990: Jeremy Brigham, Peoples Church Minister had contact with Rev. Gyorgy Andrasi, Minister of the Unitarian Church in Komjatszeg, Transylvania, Romania, where the members are of Hungarian origin.

March 18, 1990: Rev. Brigham, suggested to the Board of Trustees of Peoples, that a partnership be considered. The board agreed. Partnerships are promoted by the UU Partner Church Council.

1992. The Peoples Church Wider Affairs Committee members were: Gene Jahncke, Doris Hamiliton, John Ely, Polly Ely, and Florence Ballentyne, Chaired by Roy Watkins. The committee wanted an active partnership. Numerous attempts to make contact failed.

1998: Roy Watkins made contact by telephone to Rev. Andrasi in Romania. Rev. Andrasi explained the difficult economic circumstances of the community in their struggles to recover after the communist revolution in 1989.

May 24 1998. The same committee decided to hold a dinner to raise funds to send to the Partner Church. The first "Hungarian Dinner" took place in the Peoples Church basement. Catered by Kirkwood Community College Culinary students, the dinner menu had Hungarian ethnic dishes with "Bull's Blood" wine from the village of Egri in Hungary. Dinner and silent auction proceeds were \$1,462. 87 tickets were sold. Julie and George Triplett from the Kansas City area explained their visit to their partner church in Romania with a slide show. \$1,000 was sent to our partners. The money was gratefully received by the congregants and used for gasoline expenses for the minister who had to travel from Komjatseg, about 30 miles away, a wood carved gate in front of the church building, furniture for their pre-school Christmas presents and clothing for the children.

May 11, 2001, November 2002, 2004, 2005, and 2006: "Hungarian Dinners" for the purpose of raising funds. Each time, the committee was able to send \$1,000 for such needs as a computer for the minister, a scholarship to send a student to high school in Komjatseg, a fence for around the church property, (very important to their culture) and renovation of the church that was built in the 1800s. The dinners were well attended by the congregation and many members worked hard to make them successful.

November 4, 2004, Kristiana Bagula, Rev. Andrasi's daughter flew from her home in Little Rock, AK, and was guest speaker.

March 5, 2006, Rev. Andrasi visited Peoples Church and delivered a "Transylvanian Church Service" at Peoples. Activities included dinner at the Amanas, together with Bryan Davis, Board President, Rev. Rick Koyle minister at Peoples, original members of the Denominational Affairs Committee, and including Louise Wickham, and Jan Watkins, who had become active members of the committee.

June, 2007: A Peoples Church delegation visited our Partner Church in Romania for one week and were honored guests at a Sunday service celebrating the restoration of their church. It was attended by several denomination dignitaries. A painting by an artist in their congregation was presented to our congregation. Those making the journey to Transylvania were Roy and Jan Watkins, Bryan and Kris Davis, John Karn, Tony Browning and Susan Elliot Bryan. Visits to several historical sites recognizing our Unitarian roots were made possible by our hosts.

2012: Rev. Andrasi retires. The Denominational Affairs Committee lost most members due to death, disability, and greater church needs related to the transition to the church on Gordon Ave. The committee has not been revived as of 2015.
