Have you ever paid \$12 to see a twohour movie in the theatre and had a spiritual experience? What made this experience so powerful? Did you even realize how much time went by?

I am willing to bet you were completely immersed in the experience, never once taken out of the moment to notice what time it was. You were fully engaged through beautiful images, music, and drama, captivated by the story, and, by the end of the film, given new eyes to see the world a little bit differently. You were transformed through art.

There is no reason why worship can't be just like this.

Like a good film, good worship engages all of the senses to tell a story and inspire people through beauty and art. It uses music, visual arts, spoken word, and action or "drama" to create an all-inclusive, transformative experience.

This is not a new idea. In Art and Religion (1921) Unitarian minister and worship theorist Von Ogden Vogt said that "beauty is desirable and good" and that good worship engages beauty in every way. He said, "the art of worship is an all-comprehending art. No other art can satisfy the demand of human nature for an all-inclusive experience."

This is possible at Peoples Church. Sensory-rich, all-inclusive, don't-care-what-time-it-is worship is possible when we approach it as an art form and pay attention to beauty.

To learn more about this concept, David Wise and I recently attended Worship Design Studio, workshop led by world-renowned worship designer Marcia McFee. We discovered that high-quality worship film-every element a contributes to the overall feel of the experience, including the worship space. The colors, décor, seating, cleanliness, energy and feel of the sanctuary communicate more than we realize in worship. A film director wouldn't film a light, uplifting part of a movie in a dark cave, nor what she film an intimate, tender moment in a stark, sterile room. Setting matters. Space matters. Beauty matters.

For these reasons, not to mention the rich connection with our history the windows provide, I am absolutely thrilled that we are moving forward with installing the Rose and Star windows stained glass in sanctuary. The design the Aesthetics and Windows Teams came up with and the congregation voted on is absolutely gorgeous and I believe it will make a huge difference in our worship lives! Making our sanctuary more beautiful has the power to elevate souls, connect us with the Holy and help facilitate rich, healing, inspiring, transformative experiences in worship. So, next time you see a Windows or Aesthetics Team Member be sure to thank them for all the good work they are doing!

"I hate change!"

"Change is hard!"

"Change stinks!"

This process is in place to ensure that we have the support for any payments in our records and is part of our record retention policy. Thank you for your compliance.


#### FINANCE COMMITTEE UPDATE

Finance Committee met on 5/10/18 to review financial reports and discuss report for Annual Meeting.

Peoples Church cash flow was positive for the month. April income included large annual pledge, fundraising event(s) income, and scheduled endowment disbursement:







It's really real. The title "President of the Board of Peoples Church UU" is now mine.

I find I'm alternating between energized excitement ("Wow! I get to be part of really moving Peoples forward!") and dismay ("What makes me think I've got what it takes to do a good job here?").

I've finally realized I'm perfect for this or any leadership position at Peoples, because:

- I'm excited and energized
- I'm dismayed
- I'm doing it anyway

In other words, I'm doing exactly what every team chairperson in the history of our church has probably done: acknowledged they may not know exactly what they're doing, but choosing to do it anyway because they're committed to Peoples.

This is a not-so-subtle way of letting everyone know that "Oh, I don't know enough to take that leadership role" is not gonna cut any ice with me. We all get to step up into leadership positions, no matter how little we may feel we know about what that entails, because:

- Peoples is worth it
- We can be confident we're going to have a whole bunch of excellent company in those feelings

And my definition of "leadership role" is pretty darn flexible. Leadership is not just being a member of the Board. In my view, a leader at Peoples is anyone who:

- does more than just go through the motions (think of church Operations Manager Cathy Fischer, who creates not just informative Voices, but beautiful ones)
- finds a way to contribute their skills to Peoples, despite the crazy busy-ness of their lives (think of Arianne Waseen, Abram Doval, and Megan and Tim Jones, parents working around kids' needs to practice so they can provide delightful special music at services)
- agrees to join a team for the first time (think of new-ish member Lu Wilcox joining the Nominating Committee)
- sees an opportunity to introduce more people to Peoples and works to make it happen (think of Jude Johnson spearheading the effort to bring The Vagina Monologues here)
- speaks up for herself with a comment, question, or concern (think of new member Florencia Lynch) mentioning to me at a service how she likes to slowly settle in to a new situation, at her own pace, and how she appreciates not feeling "pressured" into trying new activities before they're a good fit for her
- supports Peoples activities, even if she doesn't often participate in them (think of Linda Levy being one of the planners for Peoples' participation in Cedar Rapids PrideFest, even though she's not a member of the LGBTQ community)
- finds a way to participate as a member of Peoples outside Sunday services (think of newer members Sarah Hermann and Kate Martinek choosing to become HomeChurch facilitators)

See? There are a ton of leaders at Peoples, and equally many ways to step up into some form of leadership in this beloved community. So don't do yourself – or Peoples – the disservice of saying, "Oh, I'm not cut out to be a leader." Because you so are.

#### **Peoples Church Stewardship Drive for 2019**

July 1 will mark the beginning of our stewardship where you will be contacted, if you have not yet drive for 2019 entitled "Embrace the Mission". This pledged or responded. will be our shared opportunity to do exactly as the title says by sharing in the financial support of the recently adopted Peoples Church mission statement.

Our shared goal this year is to raise \$160,000 in that you thoughtfully consider the overall 7% pledges, which represents a 7% or \$10,400 increase increase goal for the congregation, what this from our 2018 pledges. The good news here is two-continued success would mean to Peoples Church, eliminate the use of Unrestricted Fund dollars for family. our general operating budget, preserving them for future needs. Second, we have demonstrated that we can do this! If you look at the past two years we have increased our pledging on average at a rate of \$10,600/year.

As in the past two years there will be a "No Hassle" portion of the campaign (Jul 1 – Aug 15) where you can quickly and easily complete the entire pledging process via US mail, email, or at a staffed pledge This will be followed by a table on Sundays. "conventional" pledge campaign (Aug 15 – Sept 30)

#### **Third Quarter Book Selection**

Our third quarter book is We Were Eight Years in Power: An American Tragedy by Ta - Nehisi Coates. Toni Morrison says about this book; "I've been wondering who might fill the intellectual void that plagued me after James Baldwin died. Clearly it is Ta-Nehisi Coates." The book features Coates's iconic essays from The Atlantic, including, "Fear of a Black President," The Case for Reparations," and "the Black Family in the Age of Mass Incarceration."

Four copies of the book are available from the public library. The library also has the book available for loan in all electronic formats. The book can be purchased electronically for around \$14.

In lieu of reading the whole book participants can read one or more of Coates's essays published in The Atlantic during the last seven years. We will be planning at least two group discussions on this book/essays during the months of July, August, and September.

## Quire Concert: Eastern Iowa's GLBT Chorus

This concert will feature the lowa premiere of Bayard Rustin. The Man Behind the Dream, a choral work by Cincinnati composer Steve Milloy, honoring the life of civil rights leader. Bayard Rustin through story and song. Rustin, an openly gay black man and member of the Quaker faith, is best remembered as one of the key organizers of the 1963 March on Washington. He was a friend and mentor to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., introduced nonviolent protest techniques to the American civil rights movement, and persevered through harassment, arrest, imprisonment and physical aggression, largely in response to his refusal to be closeted and his drive to speak out wherever he saw injustice.
