# Minister's Moment

## Liminal Time

We are living together through a peculiar, liminal time right now. We all know that a huge change is looming as we prepare to end our ministry together and begin readying ourselves for new and separate pathways. But for the moment, nothing has changed. We're still together on Sundays at worship; I still meet with committees, make pastoral visits and write sermons. It can therefore feel peculiar and in-between: are we coming or going?

That's why this is a liminal time for us. The dictionary defines liminal as *occupying a position at, or on both sides of, a boundary or threshold.* The threshold we've reached is the one that marks the end of our two years as minister and congregation, and the start of a new chapter. But for some weeks still, we're standing on both sides of that boundary, and this can be a bit disconcerting for all of us.

But these threshold weeks are filled with a unique opportunity. We have the chance to help each other learn, or to remember again, how to move through transitions with grace and clarity. One way we do this is by acknowledging the whole spectrum of feelings that can rise up: sadness along with excitement, anxiety side by side with curiosity, gratitude, uncertainty, perhaps even indignation or relief. Transitions have a way of evoking all of these feelings, and more—and it's okay to feel them all at the same time, if that's how they arise.

Another way we manage this change gracefully is to be sure we've said what we need to say to one another. I have received notes, letters and e-mails from you. I have met with some people. I am not too busy to meet with you. Quite the contrary, in fact: if you want to meet with me individually, no matter what the concern or emotion you'd like to express, I am eager to spend the time with you, so please do call or e-mail and we'll make a date.

Like many of you, I'm finding this liminal time a bit confusing, but I also recognize its gifts. I look forward to hearing from you—through whichever mode you choose—as these spring days unfold around us.

Developmental Ministry
Report on Tough Tasks #4 & 5:
Mission and Vision

As part of the interim transition process toward Developmental

Ministry, the congregation has been asked to complete a series of **Tough Tasks**. In February and March, Rev. Jeff Briere led participants in two talking circles met to consider the final two tasks: considering Peoples' mission, and our broader vision, both foundations of the church. Judy Price and Scott Mansfield were

scribes at each gathering and provided this summary. The future mission and vision statements will be completed during the developmental ministry.

To clarify the terms,

**#4 - Mission:** defines our broader sense of purpose and direction while honoring its evolutionary nature.

#5 - Vision: identifies and commits to a specific direction for a three-to-five-year period.

#### MISSION

Rev. Briere posed these questions:

- ★ What the church does?
- ★ Who do we do it for?
- ★ Why we do it?

Two themes that emerged during discussion: what we are doing now; how to decide on our mission.

#### People talked about our church work:

- Social justice outreach
- · Donations to Linn County Food Bank
- Paraministry program for members needing pastoral care;
- Congregation selects social justice projects (this year it's health care access, last year it was income equality and we adopted Olivet Head Start classroom) and plate-sharing recipients;
- Cooks' Night Out supported families by providing community meal with activities for children and socialization for parents;
- Neighborhood outreach: door-knocking, passing out brochures, talking with neighbors for a butterfly effect; RE Director planning block party for fall.

#### Choosing a mission:

- Use consumer science methods such as segmentation and targeting as we make assessments (e.g., get map and put pin in it for every member address, inventory member strength, etc.)
- Assess our resources and scale mission to our resources.
- Assess needs of our current church population, understanding the congregation's ebb and flow in church involvement
- Understand how different generations approach social action, church involvement, etc.

- Assess how the world is changing/reorganizing
- · Assess neighborhood and community needs
- Learn what other groups are doing what we want to do; can we join them? And can we make sure we do not step on anyone's toes?
- Make a communication plan to keep mission on front burner all the time
- Continue to think and document ideas to share in future conversations.

#### VISION .....

Rev. Briere posed several questions to focus the circle on our Vision:

- ★ Where does the church want to be in seven to ten years?
- ★ What is the future impact of what we do?
- ★ What do we want to be known for?
- ★ How would the world be a better place because of Peoples Church?

Three vision themes emerged: growth, social justice, and church community.

#### Thoughts on growth

- Increasing membership/having more staff would help our effectiveness;
- Does the community want or appreciate anything that we can actually deliver?
- · Ideas shared on what people think will encourage growth;
- Becoming a magnetic church—attracting others to our doors;
- Reaching out to the community to meet identified need(s);
- Partnering with other organizations and/or groups in town;
- · Using the church building every day of the week;
- · Welcoming children and youth since they may bring their parents;
- Expanding our west-side presence/welcoming our immediate neighborhood.

#### Thoughts on social justice

- Work to create more equitable relationships in Cedar Rapids; address needs of persons with low-incomes
- External vs. internal focus was discussed: do we address individual spiritual needs or does our spiritual path lead to engagement in the world?
- The need to address spirit: work on self, work in church community, and work outside in larger community nurtures our own spiritual growth;
- Put UU Principles into action in wider community;
- Create/support community leaders within our congregation;
- Join with other community faith groups to address big issues like hunger and environment;
- · Growing "church that helps others" reputation;
- Common ground that everyone shares: we need a new glue (thirty years ago Humanism was that glue; that's not the case today);
- · Can social justice be our new glue?

#### Thoughts on church community

- Promoting active listening, knowing, appreciating others' stories/strengths as well as our own;
- · Committing to each other;

## Board Meeting at-a-Glance

#### March 20, 2016

- We agreed to nominate Susan Frederick-Gray for Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) presidential candidate. UUA presidential nominees require support from 25 member congregations to be placed on the ballot, but our members are not required to vote for her.
- Stewardship work group reported the campaign this year will start July 1 and end by September 30. The theme will be *The Turning Point*. We may also host a generosity workshop on May 14. This will be on the May meeting agenda.
- The MidAmerica Regional Assembly is coming up April 29 May 1 in St. Paul, Minnesota. Two people plan to attend, and a scholarship is available to cover registration and two nights' lodging for a third person. If interested, contact Bryan Davis. See article on page 3 for more information.
- We have not received any applications for developmental minister yet. We discussed
  alternatives such as hiring a second interim minister, and will follow up at the April
  meeting.
- We approved Kathleen Watson's comment board concept, and discussed bulletin board locations. We will hang two boards outside the Ely Room, and one inside near the door
