Judy Price, co-facilitator of Talking Circles and Interim Transition Team member, invites Peoples people to participate in our next Talking Circle, Mission and Vision. She writes:

Trying to help other people fix their broken lives had somehow overwhelmed my moral compass. Soaking up the sacred energy of that service, I realized I was adrift and in need. That day Peoples Church became my personal lodestone; something that I could use to reset my compass to find my way in the sea of human tragedy that flooded my work week. If I had to describe the vibrations or qualities of this lodestone they would be:

Welcoming Vision of a Larger Picture, a Wider World Courage to Reason

TODAY, my mission/vision statement would be that Peoples Church pulls us out of our lives and connects us with the wider world by creating a welcoming place open to learning. Something like that. What about you? What's your story? What do you see/hear/feel?

Minister's *Moment*



A while back, I was asked to explain worship in a Unitarian Universalist setting. Worship, as I use the word, refers to a program of elements promoting a theme or an idea for the consideration of the congregation. This church produces a worship service each Sunday morning and at other times for various purposes.

We can use the word as a verb as well. I once heard a woman—whom I thought was a reasonable person—say that she worships Barry Manilow. When we worship, we place the object of our worship on some sort of pedestal and offer our homage and devotion.

In reference to a religious service, the sense I invoke goes back to the root of the word in Old English. Worship comes to us from *weorthscipe*, meaning "worth–ship," or the shape of something worthy. When I use the word as a verb, I refer to the process of giving that worthy concept a shape that we can see or hear or feel or smell or taste. In other words, bringing that worth to our senses, to life.

In a worship service, the congregation is actually the shaper, that is, the congregation determines the shape of the worth through participation in a common ritual. The minister provides the raw materials and maybe a road map, but getting to the destination is something the congregation and minister do together.

Gathering those raw materials is what service preparation is all about. Because everyone is not moved by the same thing, I try to bring many elements into the worship service so that at least one element will appeal to someone.


It might be the music that moves you, or poetry or a story or the image on the cover of the program. But at least one thing in the worship service ought to appeal to everyone present and inspire their thoughts about the theme of the service.

For a worship service, I try to use several modes of communication. Speech is important, but so are music and poetry and images. It's a challenge to appeal to the sense of touch and taste, but not impossible. Kinesthesia, or the sense of movement, is another sensation which I would like to tap in worship. So I try to find elements that appeal to all the senses.

In terms of style, the Unitarian culture of worship for many years was characterized by an over-emphasis on the sermon and the spoken word. Nowadays, it seems to me that a straightforward, academic presentation has limited appeal. I think that communication in our culture has shifted away from the carefully laid—out, comprehensive logical presentation. In the days of Channing and Emerson, people customarily sat still and listened to a sermon of 60 to 90 minutes. No minister today has that much to say and no congregation has that much patience.

So my style is a little more Universalist—a little looser—although I still prepare a script and pretty much stick to it. Different aspects of communication are appropriate for a sermon. I make frequent use of hUUmor, irony, sarcasm, hyperbole and imperfect analogies.

You might think that laughter in a worship service is inappropriate. I think it's fine. It allows the congregation to release tension and find a way to common ground. You might be accustomed to a solemn and sober sermon. On occasion, I might present such a sermon, but more likely, it will be more casual and more accessible. You might think applause is inappropriate. Within limits, I think it shows the congregation's approval of the moment. However, I am aware that it can be disruptive, so I caution you against applauding anything and everything that appeals to you.

Developmental Ministry Search Committee Update: Good News!

Peoples Church's application for a developmental minister to begin our 2016-2017 church year has been accepted by the UUA. The core of the application is the five goals presented in the application that were culled from congregational input over the past year. These five goals will be the focus for the developmental minister to foster change and growth from within our congregation:

- 1. **Governance:** establish church governance structures and practices that make the best use of church resources.
- 2. **Financial Stewardship:** develop, implement and maintain a financial stewardship system based on generosity and stewardship as theological foundations understood by all members of the Peoples Church community.
- 3. **Communication:** communicate positively and consistently among Peoples Church stakeholders.
- 4. **Membership:** develop and maintain rich and vigorous processes for attracting and integrating members.
- Involvement in Broader Communities: develop and implement a plan for increasing Peoples Church presence and involvement in the geographical and religious communities of Cedar Rapids and beyond.

Although there are no definite dates or timelines, the committee should be receiving the first candidate names around February 1 and hopefully the process of calling a minister will be completed by the beginning of March. Again, this minister would begin at Peoples at the beginning of August 2016.

moment. However, I am aware that it can be disruptive, so I caution you against applauding anything and everything that appeals to you.

We all come to church on Sunday morning from different places—literally and figuratively. I might be worried when I arrive at church. You might be expectant. Another person might be half-asleep. So each of us brings something to the service, something affected by our feelings and what happened the night before and what we read in the paper and so forth. A successful worship service allows the congregation and the minister to take a step into the mystery, to get a glimpse of the profound and holy nature of human life. What's important is that we take the step together.

Board Meeting Summary

- We confirmed new member **Paula Hinzman Mitchell**. Please welcome to Peoples both her and her daughter, **Autumn**.
- Treasurer Gary McGraw reported we ended 2015 with a deficit of ~\$17K, and he
 projects a deficit for 2016 as well. We can rely on reserves briefly while as we begin
 turning things around with the Developmental Minister, but changes need to happen
 soon. Kathleen volunteered to meet with Bob Butikofer to look into possible grants
 for jump starting projects.
- Gary also reported the Finance Committee met to discuss endowment policy with Rich Patterson. The committee will provide a plan for calculating the amount we draw annually to use in the operations budget.
- We discussed the draft membership policy, and Robyn will submit a revised version for our next meeting.
- We will begin looking for people to investigate and lead the certification process to become a **Green Sanctuary**.
- We discussed creating a commenting/feedback system and Kathleen will submit a
 proposal at our next meeting.
- Kylene suggested a fundraiser selling the extra stained glass. Lance will gather information about which pieces we would like to keep and what we may want to do with them.

The Peoples Finance Committee met on January 14 to review financial reports and discuss income diversification for Peoples Church. Church cash flow for December was negative:
