Minister's **Moment**

Close Encounters of the Giraffe Kind

I read a report the other day that Ringling Brothers Barnum & Bailey is phasing out elephants from their acts. They are on board with treating these gentle giants more humanely. I was reminded of the time I fed the giraffes.

I like zoos. I have visited several all over the world. The San Diego Zoo stands out in my estimation. Also, the Berlin Zoo. But these two are very large and you need to set aside a couple days to see all the exhibits. The Chattanooga Aquarium is outstanding. One of my favorite zoos is at the New York State Fair, where every year, they fill a few aquariums with fresh-water fish native to the state.

Smaller zoos are fun in a different way. Zoo Miami is a medium–sized zoo, and with a medium–size operation, it can do some very nice things. Like feeding giraffes. For two bucks, Zoo Miami will sell you a handful of Romaine lettuce which you can use to feed the giraffes.

What great fun for everyone! Kids are tickled and adults can't stop grinning. Even the lettuce vendors have fun.


Giraffes are graceful giants, with long prehensile tongues which they use to gently pluck the lettuce from your hand. Zoo Miami has built a feeding station that puts people at the same height as the giraffes, so you have a face—to—face meeting with these beautiful animals.

My daughter and her daughter had a wonderful time as they slowly extended a few leaves to the giraffe, which slowly extended his long tongue and took the lettuce. Giraffes have long eyelashes, making them look very appealing and they are very quiet, they are not at all scary, even for very young children.

I was very impressed. I know that some purists will decry the exhibit, saying that zoo animals should be seen in their natural habitat, or as near to it as possible. But I think exceptions can be made. I'm not crazy about circuses with acrobatic bears and dancing elephants, but I do like opportunities to interact with other species.


I like to interact with my own species, too. And I think we can take a lesson from the giraffes. When interacting with our own species, do we move slowly? Do we look each other in the face? Do we extend our hand gently? Do we smile? Do we say, "Please" and "Thank you?"

Keynote speaker: Harvey Harrison

Harvey is a retired lawyer now engaged in school mediation projects and racial justice advocacy. His work was inspired by reading Michelle Alexander's seminal book: The New Jim Crow – Mass Incarceration in the Age of Color Blindness. Harvey is a 1969 graduate of the University of Iowa Law School. He had a general civil law practice on the East side of Des Moines until his retirement in 2011.

Over the last four years, he has led classes examining Alexander's book, given a number of public presentations on the issues raised by her book, participated in public meetings and forums related to these issues, served as a member on the Polk County Racial Profiling working group that was initiated by a collaboration between the NAACP, the Drake Legal Clinic and AMOS and worked with the AMOS Criminal Justice Research group. In doing this work, Harvey has developed a particular interest in "The lowa Connection" on racial justice issues and what steps are necessary to transform the current practices that identify lowa as one of the worst states on issues of racial justice and disproportionate incarceration.

Harvey has also been involved in the creation and implementation of alternative dispute resolution programs in the Des Moines Public Schools and worked in collaboration with the Des Moines Police Department to establish a diversion program for juveniles. This work has been the result of work by AMOS and assisted by the efforts of the lowa Mediation Service. The focus of this work is to teach young people new methods to resolve disputes and to help young people stay out of the Juvenile Justice system.

As a result of his membership on the NAACP Legal Redress Committee Harvey is currently involved in the drafting of legislation to be submitted to the lowa Legislature that will prohibit racial profiling. This work includes the creation of a broadly based coalition to support this initiative.
