BOARD OF TRUSTEE MEETING SUMMARY

May 17, 2017

- Treasurer Gary McGraw reported a \$1,378 deficit in April. Our overall balance for the year is still positive due to early pledge payments and our second quarterly endowment disbursement.
- We reviewed the proposed church record retention policy and procedure submitted by our Operations Coordinator, Cathy Fischer. She created a list of the types of information the church keeps and the length of time it should be kept. We added several items to the list and will ask that she submit a revised proposal for approval at our June meeting.
- As part of the church record policy discussion, we agreed to ask Cathy F. to begin planning a shared electronic document filing system using a cloud computing option such as Dropbox or One Drive. We would like to create a folder and sharing structure that will allow volunteers and staff to store church-related items in a secure place where they can be easily used by all pertinent parties.
- We began discussing the facility project proposal policy and procedure. We currently have several facility related projects pending review but no established method to evaluate them for approval or revision. The board will work to establish an evaluation criteria and process that congregation members and the Facility Team will then be required to use.
- We reviewed the second draft of Rev. Rebecca's Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) evaluation. This is required for all new ministers during their first three years after finishing seminary. The review is due in June.

Finance Committee met on 5/11/17 to review financial reports and discuss continued income diversification plans for Peoples Church.

Peoples Church cash flow for April was negative, but Year-To-Date we have a \$10,000 surplus due to prepayment of pledges:

- April Income \$15,336
- April Expenses \$16,714

PRESIDENT MESSAGE

In his essay, Finding the Right Vision, Burt Nanus explains that every organization must at some point ask, "What's next, and why?"

For Peoples Church, what's next is articulating our vision. Why? Because ultimately our church vision will help define our mission. Said another way, our vision identifies the horizon while our mission outlines the work we do to reach that horizon.

Our vision will also answer these two questions in a larger sense. We should always be able to answer "What's next, and why?" by looking at our vision.

If our vision is for everyone in Cedar Rapids to have shelter, our mission could be to build a homeless shelter in an underserved area of the city. When that's done, we look back to our vision to inspire a new mission. Perhaps next we do something to address the underlying causes of homelessness. When that's done, we revisit the vision again, and so on.

But visions can change in the same way times change and people change. We must revisit the vision and sometimes revise it in order

for it to stay relevant to our present community.

In May, we worked on identifying our church's values. In June, we will kick off the work to identify our church's vision based on those values. And the first vision activity will be a party!

On Wednesday, June 28 at 6:30 PM, all Peoples people are invited to come party like it's 2027. 10 years from now, what stories do we want to tell about our church community's accomplishments? Where do we want to be, and what do we want to look back on?

WHAT IS THE PROPOSED 8TH PRINCIPLE?

Our original Principles and Purposes were adopted at the consolidation of the American Unitarian Association and the Universalist Church of America in 1961. They were revised in 1985 and amended in 1995. The 7 Principles we refer to today have served us for more than 30 years, but they were never meant to be a belief statement or creed.

Our Principles are part of the governing bylaws of the Unitarian Universalist Association and function as the covenant of its member congregations. Covenants are living things that we get to review and revise as necessary.

And this brings us to today. In

2017, the Black Lives of UU (BLUU) Organizing Collective is proposing the formal adoption of an 8th principle, within the stated principles of our faith.

The proposed 8th principle states:

"Journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

How can we live into this proposed 8th Principle here at Peoples Church?

STAINED GLASS WINDOW UPDATE

The members of the recently formed Stained Glass Team met for the first time to determine the future of the stained glass windows kept from our historic downtown church. These windows were removed from the previous church building when our congregation moved to our current location and the previous church was razed.

The team indicated with some certainty the scope of work to be accomplished would be:

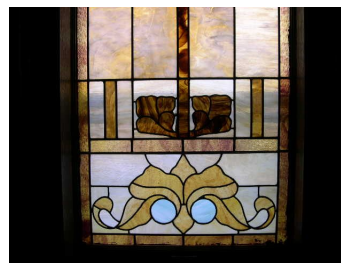
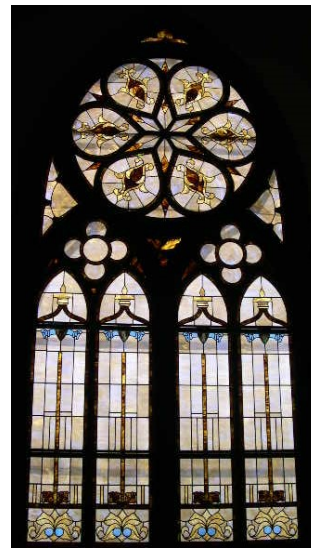
- any installation of stained glass windows in our sanctuary would be mounted within a box with back-lighting. Consequently there would be no exposure of the windows to the outside environment.
- a goal would be to install the 6x0 inch round window on the rear wall of our sanctuary. This was the window that was above the organ pipes in the Third Ave church
- install the large 216 x 92 inch window on the front wall of our sanctuary. This was the window in the back of our sanctuary in the Third Ave church.
- several of the twelve roughly six foot windows from the prior church would be installed on the side walls of our sanctuary.

Mark Minger, who has worked with stained glass windows for over 30 years and was part of the team that installed stained glass windows from the flooded Salem United Methodist church into their new church building, examined parts of several windows. It appears that any window we plan to install needs cleaning and inspection for cracks, plus the wood frames and caulking/putty need to be examined and updated as necessary, possibly with the leading being redone.

Work is slated to start on one of the twelve six foot windows that would eventually be installed on the side walls. Mr. Minger agreed to oversee our work starting out once we have a work environment and people ready to help.

For the two main windows, the Stain Glass Window Team will contact at least two companies that are experts in stained glass restoration and obtain a quote for the work.

After windows are restored, Peoples will still need to have a team for box development to hold the windows and provide proper back lighting.



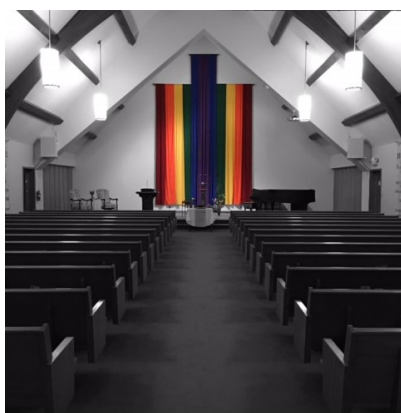

Community Room at Unity Center

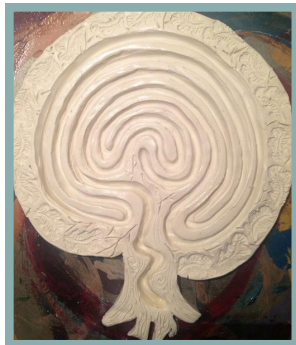
June 10th, 1-4pm

PEOPLES CHURCH RECEIVES LEGACY DISTRIBUTION

Peoples Church recently received an annual distribution from the Jay G. Sigmund Endowed Fund held by the Greater Cedar Rapids Community Foundation. Although modest in size it gave a boost to the budget and brought back memories of this generous family.

Jay Sigmund was an insurance executive best known for his poetry that centered on the land he loved near Waubeek. His son Jim Sigmund wed Virginia and they enjoyed a long life together and had a son named Jay G. Sigmund II together. Virginia Sigmund was a longtime member of Peoples Church and served on the board of Directors and on many committees. Following Jim's death she married Kenneth Myers and began using the name Virginia Sigmund Myers. Her son, Jay G. Sigmund II, was born in 1937 and as a child developed a love of fishing. He often visited Indian Creek where the Nature Center is now located to catch bass and catfish. He went on to a successful career in the US Navy. Following retirement he became an offshore fly fishing guide in Florida. Jay took clients out in the ocean to pursue big fish. He may have grown up in the Peoples RE program but I could not confirm this. He died of cancer on March 31, 1999.

In 2004 Virginia contacted me and told me she'd like to establish an endowed fund that would honor her family and create an annual cash distribution to Peoples and



the Nature Center. I helped her set this up, and it was approved by the Foundation board on November 22, 2004. Virginia died on October 16, 2006.

Although the Sigmund's connected with Peoples and the Nature Center have all died, Virginia created a family legacy that lives on through annual distributions to the two organizations. Although she's been dead for 11 years she continues to give generously and the distributions will continue.....forever.

Endowed funds create legacies for families that keep their names and memories alive long after they've departed. Both the Church and the Nature Center are happy to work with anyone interested in creating a legacy endowed fund. It does not take a large amount of money to create a legacy endowment to honor a family and help the Church. Please give me a call if you have interest.

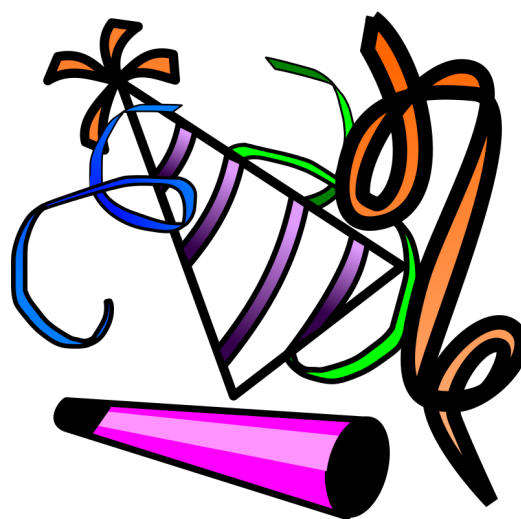
COME PARTY WITH US LIKE IT'S 2027

Our Coming of Age youth took part in a pilgrimage to Boston this spring to study and visit some of the most historically significant locations known to the Unitarian Universalist faith.
