October 13th marks a step forward on our progress towards Policy Board Governance. We will be voting on revisions to our church's bylaws.

Bylaws are the code of rules that spell out how we regulate and govern the internal affairs of People's Church. Our last revision was in 2015 and there are only a few differences besides rewording.

Many of the differences are because some by-laws can now be placed in Board policies. Our Policy Governance can best be stated as allowing the Board of Trustees to govern at arm's length from operations, which fall under the Minister's responsibilities.

The Board encourages members to look at the online 2015 by-laws and compare

them to the 2019 proposed by -laws. To aid in this we have created a comparison guide, which lists additions, deletions, renumbering or ways that the older by-laws have been cleaned up. A printed copy may also be obtained at the church office.

We need a quorum of members to be able to vote on this, so please, stay after service, or give your proxy vote to someone you trust to vote for you. This should not take too long; however, we will answer questions both before and during open discussion.

We have already done so much to define our core values, craft a mission statement and our ends statements. We hope to see you there

Dear Friends,

It is with great sadness that I write you with some very unfortunate news I wish I never had to share. Scott Mansfield collapsed while at the downtown public library late Sunday afternoon, September 29th. Bystanders responded, immediately started CPR when they couldn't find a pulse, and called 911. When medical professionals



arrived, they continued CPR, brought Scott to Mercy Hospital, and proceeded to try everything possible to restart his heart, but to no avail.

Jerry Morris, friend Kevin, and I met at the hospital around 5pm. We spoke to the doctor, who informed us that Scott had died, and were given the opportunity to sit with Scott's body for a while and say our goodbyes.

To say I was in shock and deeply destressed is putting it mildly. I have spoken to many of you on the phone and received emails from even more of you and I know I am not alone in feeling this way. This is a huge loss for us.

I have been in touch with Scott's brother, Mike, and sister-in-law, Annabel, who live in New Mexico. Together we have decided to have the Memorial Service for Scott here at Peoples Church. However, we don't have a date yet. Mike and Annabel would like to be here for the service, but they are unable to travel here very quickly, so the service may be in a few weeks or even a month's time. I will communicate any updates as soon as I have them.

Beloveds, our hearts are broken, and we are devastated. It will be hard, but the only way we will get through this is if we face our grief *together*. So please don't hesitate to reach out to me, your friends, and other Peoples people for support. At times such as these it is good to share our grief and our love with others.

As such, we will be pushing out the first session of the Transgender Inclusion in Congregations Adult Forum series. That series will now begin on October 20th before worship. This week we will open a space at 10am in the Ely Room for all who wish to gather to simply be together in our time of sadness and share stories about Scott. Please join us.

Steven Chu will speak on "Climate Change and Innovative Paths to a Sustainable Future" at 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 24, in King Chapel at Cornell College. Free tickets are required. Tickets (and more info) are available online. crnl.co/delt

Thank you to everyone who participated in Peoples Church pledge campaign this historic year!!! We couldn't do this without each one of you! As I write this for the <u>Voice</u>, there are six (6) more days of the campaign. Although we have not reached our goal nor matched what we raised last year, we are very, very close...

In the past four (4) years working on these campaigns, I've learned that not everyone can make their pledge by September 30. If this is like last year, pledges will continue to arrive at the church office and, sometime in December, someone will let out a, "Whoop!" when they see that Peoples Church surpassed the goal!

So why do we end the campaign by September 30 when some people need more time? The short answer is volunteers. Volunteers have limited time they can devote to the next steps which are:

October—Treasurer and finance committee meet to decide what amount can go in each of the church's many line items and still balance in the end

November—Board of Trustees meets and reviews the budget, making any changes needed

Retaining valued staff, educating our children and adults, connecting with the community, providing a safe, nurturing environment to all, changing the world one day at a time---this is what your gifts support. JUDITH A. WALKER-RIGGS (1939-2019)

In Memory of the Rev. Judith A. Walker-Riggs (Judith Urquhart), who died on July 8, 2019, at the age of 79.

Judith was born on August 4, 1939, in Baltimore, MD, to Charles and Marjorie Louise Walker. From 1957 to 1958, she studied Comparative Religion at the University of Rochester, NY, following which she earned a Certificate in Theology from Manchester College, Oxford, England, in 1964. Judith also took courses on modern theology at the University of Oxford, while being at Manchester College. On leaving Manchester College, she was given status as a Unitarian Minister. Later, in 1987, Meadville Lombard Theological School, IL awarded her with honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Rev. Walker-Riggs was ordained on June 24, 1964, by the General Assembly of Unitarian Churches, Great Britain. Following her ordination, she served the Cairo Street Unitarian Chapel, Warrington, England for a year. In 1965, she accepted a call from the First Unitarian Church, Reading, England and served the Reading congregation until 1967. From 1968 to 1970, Rev. Walker-Riggs ministered at the First Unitarian Church, Stoneham, MA, and then at the UU Fellowship Brussels, Belgium (1971-1972). In 1972, she was again called to the First Unitarian Church, Stoneham, MA, where she would serve for four years. Thereafter, Rev. Walker-Riggs executed her vital Parish ministry at the following congregations: The Peoples Church UU, Cedar Rapids, IA (1976-1983); Mt. Vernon Unitarian Church, Alexandria, VA (1984-1985); All Souls Unitarian Church, Kansas City, MO (1986-1991); and Rosslyn Hill Unitarian Chapel, London, England (1991-1998).

From 1998 onwards, Rev. Walker-Riggs was drawn to interim ministry and served as an interim minister for the UU Congregation at Shelter Rock, Manhasset, NY (1998-2000); Main Line Unitarian Church, Devon, PA (2000-2001); Fountain Street Church, Grand Rapids, MI (2002-2004); and finally at the UU Community of El Paso, El Paso, TX (2006-2008).

Rev. Walker-Riggs carried out a great deal of services on behalf of the denomination. She functioned as LRY (Liberal Religious Youth) local and Federation officer (1954-1957); and as President for the MBD UUMA (1975-1976). She was actively involved in the UUA Extension Training (1978); and served the UUA Board of Trustees (1981-1989), Ministerial Fellowship Committee (1979-1986), the UU Ministers Association, and the

UU Women's Federation. She chaired the UUA Long-Range Planning Committee (1982-1984); and was a board member for the Governing Body of British Unitarians (1993-1998) and Starr King School for the Ministry. Furthermore, Judith served the British Unitarian Finance and Administration Committee from 1995 to 1998. She was adjunct professor at the Meadville Lombard Theological School and was one of the writers for UUA Kit, "Liberal Religion- Our Mission for the Future".

In addition to her ministry, Judith belonged to several community organizations. She served on the boards for the League of Women Voters; United Way; Red Cross; Planned Parenthood; Council of Churches; Council on Aging; Emergency shelter; Camden Ecumenical Refugee Network; and many more organizations. She was appointed to the Civil Rights Commission (1979-1983) and the 8th Circuit Court Desegregation Monitoring Committee (1987-1990). She was instrumental in setting legally required Religious Education in Schools for the London Borough of Camden. In her spare time, Judith enjoyed theatre, music, reading, walking, swimming, and crossword puzzles.

Judith's son James had these thoughts to share in reminiscence of his mother:


The thing I remember the most (and that people often mention first when remembering her services) was her "Freddy the Frog" stories. The way in which they brought children into adult service, and the opportunity for her to use her voice performance skills was legendary.

Personally, her drive for justice in the world around her really affected my brother and me. She was committed to understanding the ways in which UUs could help drive fundamental change. She influenced countless others in her congregations and in the denomination as a whole.

Judith is survived by her sons Iain Urquhart and James Urquhart; and her stepson Steven Riggs.
