Other class times will be shared in the coming weeks!


We will be sponsoring a support group for home-schooling/virtual school parents in conjunction with Coralville and the Quad Cities. More info will be available soon.

Policy Governance and Brushing Out After a Derecho are About the Same Marion Patterson, Board President

What? Has "Mme Prez" finally succumbed to heat exhaustion and lost her mind? Not exactly.

In living Policy Governance and responding to a crisis we ask: What difference do we want to make? For whom? At what healthy capacity?

Based on my short bandwidth, here is my

list. Both literal and metaphoric.

Gather Data: Assess and put systems in place.
Watch out for live wires and gas leaks. (Covenant of Right Relations, Executive and Operations Roles)

Check in: Call. Text. Email. Write Notes. Climb over brush and check in on neighbors. (Communicate)

Share ideas: None of us is as smart as all of us. Figure out different ways to get things done. (Congregational Values and Mission Statement)

Develop a flexible plan: Life happens! Like the young trees that bent before the winds, be ready to change. (As congregations change, re-visit the Mission periodically) Empower: Certain people do certain jobs like chain sawing. Stay out of each other's way and, at the same time, stay in communication. (Sources of Authority and Accountability, Transparency, Operations & Executive)

Protect: Wear protective gear. Help others. Take breaks. (Pause to Consider What is already in place. Board & Ministerial limitations)

Forgive misunderstandings: (Trust Others' Good Intentions)

Pivot when necessary: Switch to a different task and think creatively about next steps. (Create Transformative Experiences)

Show Up and Reach Out: Little offerings make a difference. Water. Food. Gift Card. Listening ear. Donations. Rake. Haul brush. (Support Mission with Time, Talent, Finances)

Create the future: Look beyond the debris to new possibilities.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

25 Black Lives Matter yard signs have been donated to us from the UU Society in Coralville. Contact macia.swift@gmail.com to make arrangements to get a sign. Some signs will be left at the church and people can pick them up during the food bank hours of Tuesday and Thursday from 9 to 10 am.

Peoples and the UU Society of Coralville have created a Faithify account to assist people such as our African neighbors who have lost everything because of the storm. Go to www.faithify.org to create an account and make a donation. Faithify is a crowdfunding site developed by the UUA in order to raise funds for UU projects. We need to reach the goal of \$5,000 by the end of September in order to receive the funds. You will not be charged your pledge amount on your credit card if we do not reach the goal. Please spread the word about this UU fund to others.

If you have extra produce from your garden you can bring it to Peoples and leave it by the African gardens. People come most everyday to work in the gardens and they need all the food they can get. We have also opened up our Peoples food pantry to our neighbors who live or lived in the Cedar Terrace and Glenbrook West apartments. Most of the displaced families have moved in with other families and are living in very crowded conditions.

The Iowa Unitarian Universalist Witness & Advocacy Network is hosting a Zoom Event featuring Damonte Stogner of the ACLU on Saving Our Democracy By Getting Out the Vote. IUUWAN Board members will introduce themselves and each UU church will share what they are doing for social justice. The event is on Sunday, September 13 from 1:30 to 3:00 pm. Community Food Assistance

Linn County Food Bank is distributing food in the parking lot of First - through Friday.

Olivet Mission at 230 10th St NW is distributing food Tuesday through Friday from 8:30 to 11:30 am. and Saturdays from 9 to 11:30 am.

Community Clothing Assistance

Olivet Mission also has free clothing available Tuesday - Friday from 8:30 - 11:30 am and Saturdays from 9:00 - 11:30 am

FEMA & Other Derecho Financial Aid for Linn County

Financial help is available to people affected by the Aug. 10 derecho, the powerful windstorm that devastated parts of lowa, particularly the Cedar Rapids area.

Here are details on financial aid from the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the state and other organizations.

FEMA assistance for individuals and homeowners

Those who suffered losses in Linn County can begin applying for assistance by through FEMA's Individual and Households Program. It provides financial assistance for homeowners and individuals to help with disaster-related recovery needs, such as grants to help pay for temporary housing, emergency home repairs, uninsured personal property losses and medical expenses caused by the disaster. The federal aid is requested for other counties but has not yet been approved.

To apply:

- Call 1-800-621-3362 or 1-800-462-7585 for TTY users. Users of 711 or Video Relay Service may call 1-800-621-3362. The toll-free telephone numbers operate from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. lowa time seven days a week, for now.
- Or register online at <u>DisasterAssistance.gov</u>.

You'll need this information to complete your registration:

- Social Security Number (SSN) OR the SSN of a minor child in the household who is a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national or qualified alien
- · Annual household income
- Contact information: Phone number, mailing address, email address*, and damaged home address (*You must provide an email address if you want to review your registration status online. If you do not provide an email address, you will be required to contact FEMA for any updates to your registration.)
- Insurance Information (coverage, insurance company name, etc.)
- Bank account information (if you are eligible to receive financial assistance, the money can be deposited in your account)

Rental and mortgage assistance

The Iowa Association of Realtors partnered with the National Association of Realtors to provide storm relief with a grant of \$250,000. This grant can help with mortgage payment assistance or rental costs due to displacement up to \$1,000 per applicant. Deadline to submit an appli-

cation is Oct. 31.

Some scenarios that would be eligible:

- A homeowner with a mortgage that was displaced due to damage of their home.
- A homeowner with a mortgage living in their home without power due to the storm damage.
- A renter that was displaced due to damage of their apartment building.

To apply:

You'll need this information to complete your registration:

- Photo identification to show proof or residency (driver's license or other government form of documentation)
- Copy of mortgage statement, mortgage payment coupon, lease agreement or rent statement
- One of the following to show proof of damage: Photos of damage; insurance estimate; copies of written claims, settlement proceeds of claim status reports; copies of repair estimates from contractors.
