

COVID UPDATE

The SOLAR SYSTEM is awaiting 2 final approvals. The city must inspect and sign off and then Alliant needs to install a meter and give their OK. Once that occurs we will be able to turn on the system and start helping the environment.

As I shared on Sunday I have been added to the Kidney Transplant list at Des Moines Unity Point Hospital. Naturally it is unknown when a transplant will be available. Plans are being made here at Peoples so that everything will happen smoothly in my absence. Once the call comes I will have about 6 hours to get to Des Moines for the surgery. When the time comes Andrea will preach the first Sunday I am gone and Angie Pierce-Jennings will preach the second week. Christine, Marion, and I have discussed all the items that need to be done on a regular basis here in the office and an action plan is being put in place. Andrea will also handle pastoral care while I am gone.

Following surgery I will be in the hospital for 2-3 days and in Des Moines for about two weeks. After that I will be home and back in the office as soon as possible They may not be full days at first, I will use sick time and vacation time to cover the days away.

A few Q and A's:

Why do need a transplant? I used an over the counter pain reliever that is bad for the kidneys. My then doctor knew I was using the drug but did not caution me against the use. I should have done more research to learn of potential issues.

What is your (fill in the blank) number? I have been asked about several numbers from tests I assure you I have the numbers as I think I have had every test imaginable! One day they did take 20 vials of blood to run all types of tests. The important thing is my kidneys are functioning at about 10% right now. I am not on dialysis at the present time and hope that can be avoided. However kidney transplants are a waiting game. One never knows when it might happen. The only issue causing me worries right now is fatigue.

Why Des Moines? There are two transplant centers in Iowa. Des Moines and Iowa City both transplant kidneys. The wait is shorter in Des Moines and my kidney specialist here is a Unity Point Physician so it makes sense to use that facility.

What can we do? Be understanding. For those for whom prayers are comfortable they are much appreciated. Good thoughts as well! This will be an interesting journey! Some of the steps might be easy and some will be hard. Knowing there are people who care for Karen and I will be invaluable.

Peoples is returning to Phase 1 of our Pandemic Response & Reopening Plan

- •Worship: online only, with a small crew of no more than 5 people physically in attendance to lead the service.
- •Weddings and Funerals: online or in person with no more than 5 people physically in attendance.
- •Adult Programs, Fundraisers, and Social Events: online only.
- •Office and Building: Anyone visiting the building should wear a mask; people should sanitize surfaces when working in office space.
- •Pastoral Care Visits: Pastoral care visits to senior living facilities, hospitals, and high-risk individuals are prohibited.

Ministerial Search Team Update

Your Search Team has been meeting weekly during August and will continue to meet at least that frequently throughout the fall.

During our first meetings, we began to wrap our heads around the full scope of the search process and all the elements involved. We also began laying the groundwork for gathering and organizing the information we will need to complete the church's Congregational Record, which is essentially our Help Wanted ad.

As we move more deeply into this work, please remember:

The Search Team is *NOT* establishing the criteria or characteristics for a potential minister. Our charge is to learn *FROM YOU* what kind of ministry we want to create as a community.

What are our dreams and aspirations within, among, and beyond Peoples Church?

In what ways will we do more to lead compassionate lives through spiritual growth and just action?

We have identified numerous areas where congregational input will be crucial to create an accurate and enticing Congregational Record. We will begin gathering that input primarily in two ways:

Survey. Yes, we know everyone recently completed a survey about the Developmental Ministry. The Search Team has those survey results and will not duplicate effort *BUT ALSO* there are questions we need to ask that are specific to the search process. Please respond to the survey quickly and completely when it goes out. More on this soon.

Small Group Discussions. We will join some of our Sunday breakout discussion groups after church services to ask questions and gather feedback. We also plan to hold separate meetings at other times so we can talk to as many people in the congregation as possible. Look for more information in the Voice, eWeekly, and before services.

You might think about this information gathering stage as similar to a 360° evaluation. We want to hear from everyone about all aspects of the church and our ministry so we can accurately convey to ministerial candidates both who we are and who we want to become.

That is the work of our entire congregation this fall.

The 8th Principle

We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions.

Our Principles have changed in relation to society's demands in the 1960s, 1970s, and 1980s. It could be time for a change in the Principles in the 2020s because recent events have shown us that many Americans are still deprived of access to liberty, equality, and justice.

UUs are actually a part of the problem. Our congregations are and have always been white centered and of European heritage in membership and leadership roles. For people identified as white, it is too easy to ignore issues of systemic racism in our congregations and in society. This is exactly what keeps the system of racism alive and, in fact, worsening right now. We need to de-center whiteness and other dominant cultures in UUism.

The 8th Principle came from a feeling that we need something to renew our commitment to

this work, to hold ourselves accountable, and to fulfill the potential of our existing principles.

Our 8th Principle Task Force will be moving Peoples toward this goal of de-centering whiteness during the next 5 months. We thank Kris Davis, Laura McGraw, David Meissler-Kubaneck, Marcia Swift, Joye Winey, and Dick Woodward, Megan Jones, and Aida Jones for their commitment to this work by serving on the Task Force.

At the GA Assembly in June 91% of the delegates voted to include anti-racism and anti-oppression in the 8th Principles. 112 UU congregations across the country have voted to adopt the 8th Principle.

The 8th Principle Task Force met on July 19th. There will be a Sermon in one of the September, October, and November Services on the 8th Principle. A Forum on the 8th Principle with a Q & A will be held on Sunday, October 10. For learning more about the 8th Principle visit https://www.8thprincipleuu.org. 100+congregations across the country have already adopted the 8th Principle. People's has done the work of anti-racism for the last several years. We are in a good position to adopt the 8th Principle at our December Congregational Meeting. Please join our mission!!

Peoples' Stained Glass Windows

Through this hot summer, church members have "spiffed up" the building and grounds. They have cleaned stuff and dust that accumulated during the Pandemic hiatus, and weeded plants that have grown in spite of the drought.

All in preparation as we highlight the church to call a settled minister.

We are making progress!

One area of "spiffing up" has been reexamining options for the remaining stained-glass windows now stored in the far back of the music room.

Joye Winey, who has served on the aesthetics' team and who spearheaded the efforts to create beautiful jewelry from some of the window pieces, has investigated this. Twenty or so panels are taking up space in the music room, the frames deteriorating, and the panes in sore need of professional, deep cleaning.

Joye has doggedly checked out 17 different possibilities such as the history and art centers, auction houses, purveyors of church artifacts, and restaurants.

Below are tentative plans to help these remaining artifacts come to life again in new homes:

- Display representative windows in the Ely room from Sept 16 to Sept 24.
- Members/friends can make an appointment to stop by the church and see them.
- Sept 19th Forum on WINDOWS.
 9:45am at Morgan Creek Park. Gather other ideas about what are practical

ways to give new life to the windows.

- Donate a window to the History Center.
 This allows the legacy of Peoples Historic Third Avenue building to continue living. The History Center will view the windows and make their decision.
- Allow members of Peoples to select a window(s) to take home and care for.
 The expectation is to remove the window from the Peoples Building by October 31, 2021. We encourage members to make a free-will gift to the congregation for the window.
- At the end October remaining windows will be offered to other sources.
- The funds will go toward continuing to beautify our building and grounds.

We believe congregational input is important. We ask you to provide some guidance. We have answers to questions you may have and welcome ideas that will help the windows find good homes and "sparkle again" in new locations. Come to the forum for a discussion or contact Joye or Marion prior to the forum.


