

#### History-whole or part?

7 History is crucial to who we are. Do we need to know everything about a person to assess their relevance? Or are some things better left out of public view? Service led by Pastor David Wise.

"Will the new minister hear me? Will MY concerns and needs be met? Will the minister understand what I'm living with? How will the community respond to our new minister?"

These are questions that when answered, a picture of the 'ideal minister' (categorized by

age, gender nationality, physical ability, race, and sexual orientation) comes to mind.

With this picture in place, it can be easy to unintentionally exclude ministers who fall into certain categories. At times we get caught up in comparing candidates to our "picture."

We can even forget what it is we hoped for in a minister.

Today, our congregation is sharing in a service about Beyond Categorical Thinking. This program is offered by the UUA for congregations involved in a ministerial search. Service led by Jerry Carden.

Our personal and family stories are riddled with holes and speckled with embellishments and hyperbole. The stories of community, corporations, cultures, and nations, are often told from a dominant perspective. Holes are conveniently filled in. Actions polished until they become the story. The back story can get lost. One interpretation dominates others.

So, how does Peoples Church authentically Hold History without perseverating on troubles, glorifying ourselves, or dismissing successes?

Preparing for the 2019 Sesquicentennial Peoples Heritage Team carefully preserved remnants from our past. Today, the Heritage Team ensures relevant pieces are kept in archives as print and audio. Photos, articles, recorded services. YouTube. Physical artifacts, photographs of honored members with rooms named after them are placed around the building and honor our past. The list of ministers graces the foyer wall. Our pictorial past is outlined near the stairs.

Various meeting minutes rest securely in our organized office systems services. people's memories. Our Covenant of Right Relations, by-laws, operational and board policies, and past Voices are accessible on the website.

We also Hold History by honoring our tradition of activism. Topics may change. Social Justice, Equanimity, and Kindness are always the bedrocks of our historical activism.

We deeply appreciate everyone's help with gathering all the information we need to create a comprehensive and exciting story about our congregation.

Right now we're busy analyzing and summarizing the information we've gathered so far.

In addition, Susan has been developing fabulous ideas for our website, which will share all kinds of fun information about Peoples Church, Cedar Rapids, and living in the Midwest. We'll let you know when it's ready to check out.

So what's next?

- 1. Once we're done with our Congregational Record, we'll send our materials to the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) for review. This will happen by mid-November.
- 2. If the UUA Transitions Office recommends changes, we will review their recommendations, possibly do some tweaking, and then resubmit.

Our Congregational Record will then go live on December 1. That's when ministerial candidates will be able to review openings and \*crossing fingers\* apply to our church!

We'll talk more about the rest of the process later.

Your Social Justice Team is working hard to develop a social justice plan for 2022 that recognizes that this will be a profound election year with so many implications for the future of our state and country. Our Sunday Forums, special events, and First Sunday Plate Collection nominees will be all geared around the races for Governor, US Senate, and 1st Congressional District US House of Representatives. All First Sunday Plate Collection nominees will be organizations working on voting rights and/or get out the vote efforts. You will learn about the plan we are recommending to the Congregation in your mailing for and participation in the December Annual Meeting. Stay tuned!!

#### The 8th Principle

We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions.

Our Principles have changed in relation to society's demands in the 1960s, 1970s, and 1980s. It could be time for a change in the Principles in the 2020s because recent events have shown us that many Americans are still deprived of access to liberty, equality, and justice.

UUs are actually a part of the problem. Our congregations are and have always been white centered and of European heritage in membership and leadership roles. For people identified as white, it is too easy to ignore issues of systemic racism in our congregations and in society. This is exactly what keeps the system of racism alive and, in fact, worsening right now. We need to de-center whiteness and other dominant cultures in UUism.

The 8th Principle came from a feeling that we need something to renew our commitment to this work,

to hold ourselves accountable, and to fulfill the potential of our existing principles.

Our 8th Principle Task Force will be moving Peoples toward this goal of de-centering whiteness during the next 5 months. We thank Kris Davis, Laura McGraw, David Miessler-Kubaneck, Marcia Swift, Joye Winey, and Dick Woodward, Megan Jones, and Aida Jones for their commitment to this work by serving on the Task Force.

At the GA Assembly in June 91% of the delegates voted to include anti-racism and anti-oppression in the 8th Principles. 112 UU congregations across the country have voted to adopt the 8th Principle.

The 8th Principle Task Force met on July 19th. There will be a Sermon in one of the September, October, and November Services on the 8th Principle. A Forum on the 8th Principle with a Q & A will be held on Sunday, October 10. For learning more about the 8th Principle visit https://www.8thprincipleuu.org. 100+ congregations across the country have already adopted the 8th Principle. People's has done the work of anti-racism for the last several years. We are in a good position to adopt the 8th Principle at our December Congregational Meeting. Please join our mission!!

#### 8th Principle Q & A

Question: After adopting the 8th Principle what does our church need to do to operationalize it?

Answer: This is an ongoing conversation with the 8th Principle Learning Community. Peoples has made great strides in partnering with and supporting groups and organizations that work to address racial injustice. We will want to make a commitment to continue and strengthen this work. Internally, we may want to take a look at our policies, procedures, Sunday Services format, and committee work? Are we being inclusive? Are we reaching out to include, welcome, respect, and celebrate diversity as a part of everything we do?
