

Big Changes to UU Principles Being Considered by UUA

On February 12 at 9:45 am there will be a Forum in person and on Zoom on the recommendations from the UUA Article II Study Commission regarding our UU Principles. The Principles as we currently know them could be altered and expanded upon. The Commission's current draft can be found in the E-Weeklies and the Voice (the link below). At the Forum we will hear about what's in the draft and discuss what we think and how we feel about these changes.

Principles

Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Bylaws, Principles and Purposes, is the foundation for all of the work of our UUA and its member congregations and covenanted communities. It is the covenant to which all of our congregations and covenanted communities pledge themselves when they become members of our UUA.

Our current Principles and Purposes were last substantially revised in 1985. At General Assembly (GA) 2017, there was discussion of amending the Principles to add an 8th Principle, addressing racism, and an amended 1st Principle, addressing non-human life. The 5th Principle was the subject of a report in 2009, which dealt with the ways in which GA and other Unitarian Universalist (UU) gatherings do and don't embody an inclusive democratic process. The 7th Principle has also been the subject of discussions about possible amendments.

There have been many projects, resolutions, task forces and other strategies that have come from the Board, the Commission on Appraisal and grassroots groups which encourage us to take a look at our principles, purposes, bylaws and rules. It is time for us to do a review and make changes so that we are living into the Unitarian Universalism of the future, a Unitarian Universalism that holds us in times of great need and ethical, moral and spiritual crises. We are in one of those times now.

In response to those discussions, the UUA Board committed to establishing this Article II Study Commission to consider possible amendments to this Article.

Tim started working at Hearn Oil and Tire in Monticello, where he learned the tire business. He later operated his own tire business at his parents farm north of Monticello. In 1987 he bought his farm near Viola where her farmed and operated his tire business.

Tim was a member a member of the Practical Farmers of Iowa. He enjoyed taking care of his many horses, cooking, dancing and thrift store shopping. He especially enjoyed time with his grandchildren.


First Sunday Plate Collection: WeVote



Peoples UU Church joined the WeVote Coalition along with 12 other community groups in forming a coalition in 2022 in anticipation of the November election. This non-partisan partnership works on voter education, voter accessibility, voter registration and voter turn-out. The Coalition assisted with organizing satellite early voting sites and provided education and registration opportunities at the Latino Festival and Asian Fest. Future projects involve working with refugee and immigrant groups on understanding the voting process and

providing access for registration and voting.

Donations are used for voter education materials and publicity through social media and at onsite events.

Join us for Intersections on Friday, February 3 as Professor Nabhan-Warren discusses meat packing in America and the connections to migrants and faith.




