Minister's Musings

This church year our themes for each month will be framed by an overarching question: **How do we live out our Shared UU Values?**Because we are part of a tradition that embraces deeds over creeds, we engage in actions to show that we are Unitarian Universalists. What practices do we engage in as we lean into our values? How do we center a Liberating Love through our behaviors?

For this month of September as we begin the program year, the theme is "The Practice of Invitation." For me, the easiest way to start practicing *invitation* is with things I already know and appreciate: "I'm inviting in laughter and time with my garden." Sounds easy, doesn't it?

The practice of invitation gets harder as the unknown and annoying become apparent; it requires me to adjust my intentions: "I'm inviting in personal patience and collective courage every time I see an election advertisement; may they remind me of our commitment to engage in democracy." (Indeed, our Shared UU Value of Justice mentions this covenant: "We support the use of inclusive democratic processes to make decisions within our congregations, our Association, and society at large.")

As you find yourself in this season full of transitions and hopes, I invite <u>you</u> to reflect on how the practice of invitation might enrich your life. What do you need to invite in *as-is?* How might you *reframe* the harder parts of life as



invitations that offer you the spiritual sustenance you're seeking? And also: what do these practices of invitation feel like in your body?

May we practice and ponder together.



What colors do each of us bring to Peoples Church? And what do those colors mean?

Color plays an important role in how we interact with the world. From an early age, we're taught what colors mean in the wider culture, and we also begin forming our own preferences for what we like to have around us and on our bodies.

Color helps us communicate peace, danger, excitement, loyalties, and so much more. Think about the color scheme of a favorite sports team or an enjoyable restaurant experience, for example. While discussing The Great Gatsby in high school, my English teacher asked us what we thought the green light meant to Gatsby. One of my classmates suggested, "Go?" (We hadn't quite figured out symbolism yet.)

Color design can also lead to challenges with inclusivity, since not everyone can perceive the same colors. And pondering a box of crayons can be its own exercise in diversity and wider cultural changes. When I was young, Crayola had only one "flesh" colored crayon, which offered an option for a fair-skinned person. Now Crayola has an entire specialty box called "Colors of the World" with 24 choices!

At the Board Retreat in August, we set aside some imaginative space to think about the colors of Peoples Church. Just like in Kindergarten, we did some coloring and then we shared our work and talked about the choices we made.

Some people created stripes and straight lines, while others created shapes and curves. Some

of the pictures were uniform while others were more "outside the lines." And some of the colors and our ideas about their meaning and significance overlapped, while others presented new perspectives.

This exercise provided a concrete way for board members to see and appreciate the similarities and diversity just in our little group of eight people. We will carry forward what we learned in this exercise as we continue our work of helping to guide Peoples Church into the future.

What about you? Would you choose one or two colors? 12 colors? More? Would you create a detailed tapestry that tells a story, or put together a patchwork quilt? And then how would you incorporate elements from everyone else's vision and experience to create a larger whole?

Start a conversation about color the next time you're hanging out with Peoples people, so we can all get to know the colors of our faith community. Together.

Postcard Project Sponsored by the Iowa Unitarian Universalist Witness & Advocacy Network

Beginning September 8 and continuing through October 13 the Social Justice Team will lead a postcard writing project in the Andre Room following Sunday Services. Our postcards will be sent to registered voters in Wisconsin who have identified as environmentalists and vote at lower-than-expected-rates. Our neighboring state of Wisconsin is a purple swing state and will be important in the November election. Our message will be a simple one of urging people to vote.

In 2022 Peoples identified saving democracy as one of its priorities. This project is in support of that issue. The stamps for the postcards will be paid for out of the church's social justice budget.

In 2024 our congregation's social justice actions will be in the areas of LGBTQ+, Native American, and reproductive rights. In addition, we will be further supporting the Linn County Immigration & Refugee Association by collecting and donating items greatly needed by new members of our community who are arriving from other countries. Items needed are clothing, especially for the winter and household goods such as pots & pans, bed sheets, towels, etc. Please keep this in mind as you do your winter and spring cleaning. Items can be brought to the church where they will be picked up by a member of the Social Justice team.

UUA's Common Read

The 2024-25 UU Common Read is <u>Authentic Selves: Celebrating Trans and Nonbinary People and Their Families</u> (Skinner House, 2023).

Through interviews and photo portraits, the subjects of this book invite readers into their real lives – their revelations, challenges, joys, and networks of support. This Common Read invites UU groups to explore the nature of living authentically and the ways connections among us help us thrive.

As the book ends, Peggy Gillespie, who conducted the interviews, writes, "...the journey of self-discovery continues for the participants and for you, the readers. Whether you are trans and/or nonbinary, questioning your identity, have trans and nonbinary loved ones, or perhaps all of the above, please remember always that you are not alone. In every moment of your lives there are opportunities to strengthen your pride and acceptance of all people, including yourselves."
